Over the years since I asked Jesus into my heart, I have taken many Bible courses, heard many sermons, and read books on prayer. But like they say, "If you want to learn something well become a teacher." Many of the principles I use in prayer now have come out of my preparation for the Bible study I teach at the Forsyth Jail each week.

True Christianity is not a religion, but rather a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ. The prayer life is more than just "saying" prayers. Prayer is a time of deep fellowship with the Father and His Son who loved me and gave Himself for me. When I begin a time of prayer I start by thinking about Jesus being on the throne of my life. I am coming before Him to worship, praise and petition Him for my needs and the needs of others. Jesus said in Matthew 6:8 "Therefore do not be like them (the heathen). For your Father knows the things you have need of before you ask Him". Oswald Chambers says in his book My Utmost for His Highest "Then why ask? The idea of prayer is not in order to get answers from God; prayer is perfect and complete oneness with God. If we pray because we want answers, we get huffed with God. The answers come every time, but not always in the way we expect, and our spiritual huff shows a refusal to identify ourselves with our Lord in prayer. We are not here to prove God answers prayer; we are here to be living monuments of God's grace". Since God hears and answers, what should we pray for? I John 5:14 gives us the answer, "Now this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us". We ask for the things we know He wants us to have. And what are those things? God tells us in His Word what He wants to give us through promises, commands and spiritual principles. Here are a few of the promises and commands I use in prayer. These verses are throughout this newsletter. As you read this newsletter, pray these verses and add your own as you fellowship with God in prayer.

⁶ Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you, ⁷ casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you.

I Peter 5: 6-7

1. Wisdom - James 1:4.
2. Guidance - Proverbs 3:5-6.
3. Victory over sin - James 4:7-9.
4. Handling anxiety - Philippians 4:6-7 and I Peter 5:6-7
5. Handling fear - Isaiah 41:10
6. Forgiveness - I John 1:9
7. Relating to and praying for others - John 15:12-13; Ephesians 3:14-19.

Remember our focus is not on our faith or the structure of our prayers but on "Him who is able to do exceedingly, abundantly above all we ask or think, according to the power that works in us". Enjoy your fellowship with Him as you spend time in prayer.

Prayer is a common theme that runs from beginning to end in the Bible. It is mentioned first in Genesis chapter 12 and last in Revelation chapter 8. Out of the 66 books that make up the Bible, prayer is found in every one of them except 13. The words pray, prayed, prayer, prayers, prayest, prayeth, and praying are found some 545 times in the Bible. We find poor and rich, broken and happy, and distressed and peaceful people praying. We find people of many different nationalities praying. We find men, women, and children praying. We find unbelievers and believers praying, and the greatest example of all, we find our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ praying. So we see by this how very important prayer is.

Webster's Collegiate Dictionary defines prayer in three ways, 1.) an address (as a petition) to God in word or thought , 2.) an earnest request or wish , and 3.) the act or practice of praying to God . So prayer is actually speaking and expressing our thoughts, with humbleness petitioning God with our desires, and doing so diligently or on a regular basis. So, lets look further at these three and see what the Bible teaches us about them. Number # 1 teaches us that words are actually involved in our communicating with God. This means that we speak to God audibly by sharing our thoughts in the words that we speak. This doesn't necessarily mean one can't pray with their mouth closed and just speak to God in their mind (heart). But even when doing that one is still speaking so to speak. It's just your mind is speaking the words instead of your mouth. We've all prayed that way before. But most often when one is found praying in the Bible, they are doing so by speaking actual words.

⁶ do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus

Petitions means to pray with respect to a particular cause. When you pray and petition God you are actually praying about something specific that you desire God to answer. God can choose to either answer or not answer your petition. If He does choose to answer, it could be immediately or at a later time. God is not obligated to answer our petitions and that is why we humbly make our petitions known to Him. Some people who prayed and petitioned God are Moses (Ex 33:12-16), Hezekiah (Isa 37:15- 20), Paul (2 Cor 12:1-10), and Jesus (Mt 26:36-44).

Moses and Hezekiah had their petitions granted. Moses, asked that he would find favor in the sight of God which he did, and Hezekiah asked that God would protect him and his people from their enemy who was the Assyrians, and God protected them. On the other hand, Paul and Jesus didn't get the petitions they desired. Paul asked that God would remove the thorn in his flesh, which He didn't, and Jesus asked that God would make another way to atone for sins besides the cross, which He didn't. That just shows that God may or may not answer our petitions, but that doesn't mean we shouldn't pray and still make them known to God. Number # 2 teaches us that when we lift our requests and wishes (desires) we are to do so earnestly which means sincerely. Praying sincerely means to be free from pretense or deceit. When we approach God we have to do so humbly, sincerely, and genuinely. God knows our hearts and whether or not we're being sincere. If our faith is sincerely (1 Tim 1:5; 2 Tim 1:5; 1 Peter 1:22), then our prayers should line up as sincerely as well. Hannah, who was barren and couldn't have children prayed to the Lord sincerely (1 Sam 1:10), and the Lord blessed her to have a child (1 Sam 1:27).

⁹ If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

The Lord also delights to bless us with the wishes (desires) of our hearts if we delight ourselves in Him (Ps 37:4; 1 Jn 5:14-15) if it's in accordance with His will for our lives.

Number # 3 teaches us that we are to make prayer an act of practice. This means that we need to pray often. Scripture confirms this. (Eph 6:18a) pray always with all prayer, (Col 4:2a) continue in prayer, (Jas 5:16) pray fervently, (1 Th 3:10) praying exceedingly night and day, and (1 Th 5:17) pray without ceasing. These are all commands to pray diligently. The best way to pray diligently is to practice praying everywhere as much as you can. And remember, we're not practicing just so we can be good at prayer but so we can become diligent at prayer. If one wants to learn better how to pray and what to pray for, I recommend studying what's known as the Lord's prayer (Mt 6:9-13). Take special notice that in the beginning of this prayer we are to come before God with a spirit of worship, adoration, and thankfulness to God the Father. We are to pray that His will be done on earth as it is in heaven. We are to confess our sins and seek God's forgiveness, while we also forgive those who might have sinned against us. We need to ask God to help us meet our needs, help keep us from giving into temptations, and help us live in such a way that our lives will shine forth the light of Jesus Christ, and Glorify God the Father. I pray that God will help us all to do this and I leave you with two closing thoughts:

- 1.) "Prayer is essential to any believer if they are going to have a close relationship with the Lord.
- 2.) a.) No prayer = No power b.) Little prayer = Little power c.) Much Prayer = Much Power.
